'Fear not' 'Do not be afraid' The words of today's Gospel are spoken by Jesus to his disciples in the context of the 'missio' - his sending them out, two by two, to proclaim the Gospel. They are sent two by two, and not alone, so that the church, which means is communion, may be visible.

Holiness is not, as some may think, personal perfection, but rather it is communion with others. To be in communion with another person means to have experienced in one's own flesh the Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is only possible to be in communion, to love, if we die to self. It is

This is a great Good News for all of us, for me and for you. As I leave Woodcliff Lake and move to Bergenfield I can do so in faith. As you bid farewell to me and welcome Fr. Jason, you also do so in faith.

We have had twelve wonderful years together, and I think we have been faithful to mission Christ has entrusted to each of us here at Our Lady Mother of the Church.

We will welcome Fr. Jason and make him feel welcome. He is a wonderful priest and I am very happy that he is going to be here.
